President Obama Statement of Administration Support (SAP): President Obama issued a SAP stating that the "Administration strongly supports Senate passage of S. 2685, the USA FREEDOM Act. In January, the President called on Congress to enact important changes to the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) that would keep our Nation safe, while enhancing privacy and better safeguarding our civil liberties," and echoing the Attorney General and Director of National Intelligence's assurances that the bill would not interfere with the Intelligence Community's operational capabilities.

Administration and Intelligence Community Support: Director of National Intelligence James Clapper and Attorney General Eric Holder wrote to Senator Leahy voicing support for the USA FREEDOM Act, stating that it will "accommodate operation needs while providing appropriate protections," and confirming that it bans bulk collection, increases transparency, and reforms the FISA Court.

Members of Congress:

House Judiciary Chairman, Representative Goodlatte, supports passing of the USA FREEDOM Act, and issued a press release stating that, "I agree with Senator Wyden and the tech community that last year's national security leaks have had a commercial and financial impact on American technology companies," and that "[w]hen the Senate returns in November, it must pass the USA Freedom Act in order to protect Americans' civil liberties and to ensure that American tech companies can begin to rebuild trust with their customers and flourish in the global economy." http://goodlatte.house.gov/press_releases/597

<u>Representative Sensenbrenner</u> also strongly supports the USA FREEDOM Act, writing to Senate leadership to tell them that he fully endorses the bill, that it institutes necessary reforms, and that "it would be a critical mistake not to take advantage of this coalition" and pass the USA FREEDOM Act this Congress.

<u>New York Times:</u> The New York Times published an op-ed strongly supporting passage of the USA FREEDOM Act, calling it "a good way to begin restoring individual privacy that has been systematically violated by government spying." The Editorial board cautioned that with its rising Libertarian wing, "[t]he Republican Party is so badly fractured that it is impossible to tell what steps it will take on domestic surveillance once it assumes control of Congress in January," but given Republican leadership's support of the Intelligence Community's surveillance programs, reform will likely be watered down in the next Congress if it is not passed now.
